rather stern while her mother was fun-loving and energetic. The family belonged to Turners, a social club in Detroit, during the forties and fifties. As a young girl Doris was quite the swimmer who

Life was forever changed for Doris when she met the man who would change the course of her life forever. His name was Robert Beuter and after falling in love, they married on January 25, 1941, in Ohio. Together they were blessed with four children, Richard, Robert, Chuck, and Judy, and they were the light of Doris's life.



A vital part of Doris's life was the Presque Isle Lodge, a little piece of heaven located directly across from Grand Lake. The best part of the lodge was that she shared this unique experience with her family. Her parents ran the operation from the time she was born and in 1947, they purchased it for themselves. Doris came alongside her mother in the day to day operation with the cooking and cleaning in addition to doing everything she could to ensure that everyone who came had a great time. Many of their family and friends came to spend the summer through the years. When her parents died,

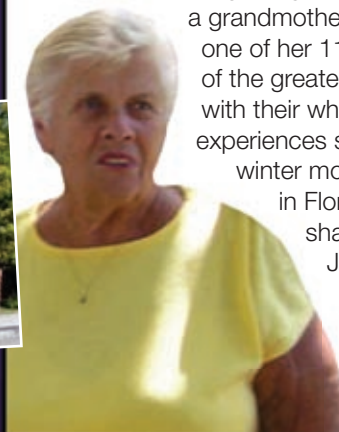

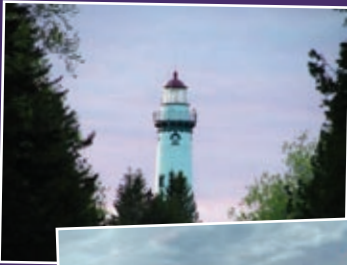
