

David's Life Story



Dave was strong, courageous, and positive in everything even when diagnosed with challenging health conditions. He leaves behind a priceless collection of memories that his friends and loved ones will cherish forever.


The 1950s were an exciting time in history filled with countless noteworthy events. Rock 'n roll took the world by storm, the civil rights movement gained momentum, and the space race got underway. Amidst this eventful time was the year 1955 that was met with great anticipation for Joseph V. Salik and Dorothy M. (Tuttle) Allen as they were awaiting the arrival of their new baby in Grand Blanc, Michigan. Their wait was over on May 14th when a healthy baby boy made his grand entrance. David Joseph was the second of four children raised alongside his siblings, Linda, Stephen, and Susan. His father worked as a dairy farmer while his mother worked at various factories and the state hospital. The Salik family moved around and Dave called Galesburg, Richland, and Alamo home during his formative years. The Salik kids were close and enjoyed playing on the farms where they lived. It has been said that Dave knew how to find mischief. He was the ringleader in countless antics and usually took his siblings along for the ride even jumping off the barn into piles of hav.

Dave attended local schools including Otsego High School where he played football. Dave was full of antics at school, too, and of course he was the instigator among his classmates. As part of the graduating class of 1974, Dave was voted class clown, best smile,

New and exciting changes were in store for Dave in 1977 when he met the girl of his dreams, Debbie Ainsworth, while he was working at Plainwell Lanes as a bouncer. Dave and Deb began dating and soon found themselves deeply in love. With a desire to spend the rest of their lives together, Dave and Deb were married on July 31, 1981 at St. Margaret's Church in Otsego. Together they welcomed two





Throughout his life Dave was a hard worker. He made a profession in the carpet cleaning industry with the majority of his career spent as the mechanic for Rug Doctor of Michigan. Dave retired when his Parkinson's disease limited his ability to work.

In his time away from work, Dave was always busy. He was mechanically gifted and loved working on race cars or fixing his daughters' cars. Dave frequented the races and watched Detroit Tigers baseball while sporting a team hat or shirt. He was also an avid bowler and loved his naps in his recliner. Dave liked cooking, but also enjoyed going out to eat often driving with Deb in their convertible to Das Essenhaus. In addition to his Tigers, Dave was an avid Michigan football fan. His favorite television shows were Dr. Phil, Criminal Minds, Wicked Tuna, and Diners, Drive-Ins, and Dives; he was never seen without the remote in his hand. Dave loved watching movies including Secretariat, Twilight, and Pitch Perfect, which he recently went to the sing-a-long with his daughter, Katie.


All who knew Dave would agree that there was truly no one like him. The heartbeat of wherever he went, Dave was famous for his Tarzan call, which always generated a room full of laughter. For years Dave sang a special song to his girls, I Had a Bird on the Yonder Tree, where he made animal sounds. The hippo sound was a favorite at family gatherings. Generous and kindhearted, he spent several years volunteering with Lending Hands. It was impossible to miss Dave's unending strength, and with his positive outlook there was nothing that got him down. He remained steadfast when diagnosed with Parkinson's disease in 2007 and again in June of 2012 when diagnosed with esophageal cancer. Dave's strength and will to fight remained intact when his right arm needed to be amputated in November

of 2012 due to the spread of his cancer. This past fall Dave had the Superman logo tattooed in periwinkle on his chest as a symbol of hope.

Although David Salik will be remembered for his crazy antics and pranks, his lifelike animal calls, and his contagious zest for








life, it will be the way he was a real life Superman that will be his lasting legacy. He freely gave unconditional love to everyone he met and lived to help others love life.
