



Placido's Life Story



Placido was one of eighteen children born to his parents, Antonio and Anastacia (Medrano) Santellan, and was raised alongside his twelve sisters and five brothers. Life was anything but easy, but the Santellan family managed the best they could. Placido and his family immigrated to the United States in 1951.

Life was forever changed for Placido when he began courting a young girl named Eloisa Moya. A short time later, the couple was married in 1955. Not long after getting married the newlyweds moved to Florida in search of a better life. It was while living in Florida that Placido and Eloisa started their family that would eventually grow to include five sons: George, Dan, Julian, Sam, and Tony. Sadly, they also mourned the loss of two infant daughters. In 1970 the Santellan family moved to





Grant, Michigan. To support his family, Placido worked as a heavy equipment operator for Grand Rapids Gravel throughout his career until he retired in 1996. He also purchased investment property in Newaygo County. Placido's success wasn't given to him, but it was earned through hard work. His success was fueled by his drive to provide for his family coupled with his heart that beat to bless others just as he had been blessed.

Rarely one to be still, Placido enriched his life in numerous ways through the years. He was a member of the Lakeshore Church of Christ, where he ministered to the Spanish community through his preaching, leading of various Bible studies, and benevolence. With a heart that loved to praise the Lord he loved, Placido also led the singing in the churches he attended. As his friends and family can attest, every meal needed to include refried beans and tortillas, and according to Placido, a meal simply was not complete without it. He enjoyed a diverse palette of music, although Latino was his favorite as well as country music.

A man of sound moral principle with a desire to serve those around him, Placido Santellan was a gift in the lives of those around him. He was more




Placido will be dearly missed and forever cherished by those too numerous to count.
